School Community Councils Network and Meet with Board of Education


Sun West hosted three workshops last November. Despite poor weather conditions approximately 150 School Community Council members attended the workshops.

Workshops were held at Outlook Elementary School, Rosetown Central High School and Kindersley Composite School. Attendees had the opportunity to participate in practical hands-on exercises organized by a committee consisting of SCC members from Landis, Eston Composite, Outlook Elementary and Kindersley Composite Schools.

The Sun West Board of Education also extended an invitation to all School Community Council chairs to meet with them on April 13, 2010, in Rosetown. The meeting was an opportunity for SCC Chairs to network with each other as well as with the Board members and to discuss issues of mutual interest as Sun West continues to build the framework of effective SCCs. As a result of the these discussions, the Board decided in 2010 that SCCs will hold their Annual General Meetings and Elections in April instead of October in order to allow more meaningful participation by parents and community members in school improvement planning in the future.

Second Sun West Division Wide Career Fair Held in April 2010

The second Sun West School Division Career Fair was held April 22, 2010 in Rosetown. Approximately 750 students in grades 10 and 11 attended from 17 Sun West schools. The fair featured a large trade show with over 50 organizations taking part, including post-secondary institutions, businesses, and government agencies. The Team Sun West Leadership students organized and ran the Career Fair as part of the Student Leadership program within Sun West.



A group of eight students formed the Sun West e-journalism team and attended the Rural Education Congress in February 2010. Students from Davidson School, Dinsmore Composite School, Rosetown Central High School, and Westcliffe School in Marengo as well as three Sun West staff members volunteered to participate on the Sun West e-Journalism Team because of their interest in journalism, technology, teaching and learning. The e-Journalism team met for one day in February, 2010 to meet each other, learn about the Congress on Rural Education and Journalism in general, and complete pre-planning activities related to the Congress. They reported from the event through video, blogs and other social media.



The third annual Sun West Leadership Conference was held in Outlook April 16–17, 2010. The iLead theme was developed by Team Sun West, a group of 11 students from 9 schools around the division. They were responsible for planning and organizing the conference for the 190 student delegates who attended it.

The conference featured a number of top-level speakers and presenters including Scott Hammell, Mike Smith, Ian Tyson, Georgette Reed and Terrance Littletent. Team Sun West started off the conference with exciting opening ceremonies and delivered iLead workshops to delegates. Plans for the fourth Sun West Student Leadership Conference are in the works and is scheduled for April 15-16, 2011 in Kindersley.



How Sun West Spends Education Dollars



Instruction - \$36,712,579 - 70%

Textbooks, educational technology, extra-curricular funding, complementary services (prekindergarten), libraries, salaries and benefits for teachers, educational assistants, school-based administrators, superintendents, and the Director of Education.

Plant/Facilities - \$7,129,446 - 13%

Heating, lighting, maintenance, repairs and improvements to division property, salaries and benefits for caretakers and maintenance personnel.

Student Transportation - \$5,342,478 - 10%

Vehicle maintenance, fuel, amortization of transportation fleet, and salaries and benefits for transportation personnel.

School-Generated Funds -\$1,775,184 - 3%

These are funds that are raised and spent at the school level, but are reported in the financial reports.

Administration - \$962,639 - 2%

Heating, lighting, maintenance, repairs and improvements to the Division Office, salaries and benefits of Division Office staff.

Other - \$695,707-1%

Tuition & related charges, loss on sale of capital assets, and fees & bank charges. Governance - \$329,224 - 1%

Board of Education meetings, elections, fees, collective bargaining costs, School Community Council grants, Student Leadership Program, public relations.

Continuous Improvement Framework (CIF)

The Continuous Improvement Framework (CIF) is designed to assist school divisions with their strategic planning. The framework provides direction for school division public reporting, and assists the Ministry of Education in obtaining important information for its own planning. The ultimate goal of the CIF is to strengthen teaching and learning for improved student outcomes. Sun West School Division continues to focus on the Ministry's four priority areas:

- Higher Literacy and Achievement,
- Equitable Opportunities,
- Smooth Transitions and,
- System Accountability and Governance.

Specific programs within Sun West address each of the priorities. Each school, in collaboration with their School Community Council (SCC), creates a School Learning Improvement Plan (SLIP) which allows schools t o implement strategies to meet established goals and report outcomes. Currently, Sun West schools are focusing on improving student performance in the literacies of reading, writing and mathematics. In the 2009-2010 school year, Sun West schools reported students experiencing increased levels of achievement (one level or more on a five level rubric) in the following areas: writing - 73.6%, reading -60.4%, and math -81.4%. Based on outcomes, Sun West schools will update their strategies and adjust performance targets to develop plans for future years.

Youth Consultation Group Meets with Board of Education in May 2010

Every year each school in the Sun West School Division with a grades 10-12 component has one student representative who will work with students in his/her school and with student representatives from other schools to gather and present student input, views and ideas to the Board of Education. The Board believes that such student contributions will prove valuable for decision-making and education in the Sun West School Division.


